Week 6 – Food.

<p>Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Working on Numbots, Mathletics and TT Rockstars - your child will have an individual login to access this.• Play on Hit the Button - focus on number bonds, halves, doubles and times tables.• Adding totals of the weekly shopping list or some work around money.• Practise telling the time. This could be done through this game (scroll down to access the game). Read to the quarter hour and the nearest 5 minutes.• Get a piece of paper and ask your child to show everything they know about Time. This could be pictures, diagrams, explanations, methods etc. They can be as creative as they want to be.• Practise counting forwards and backwards from any given number in 3s.	<p>Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• You could share a story together. This could be a chapter book where you read and discuss a chapter a day.• Listen to your child read and let them discuss what they have read. Encourage them to read with expression and intonation.• Engage in PictureNews. What did you find out? Is there anything you need help understanding?• Get your child to read a book on Oxford Owl, discuss what your child enjoyed about the book.• Explore new vocabulary you find when reading. What are the origins of this word? Can it be modified? Can you find any synonyms or antonyms for your new word?• With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for new vocabulary they are unfamiliar with. They could use a highlighter to highlight in magazines and newspapers.
<p>Weekly Spelling Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Work on Spellodrome – your child will have an individual login to access this.• Practise the Year 3/4 statutory spellings.• Practise your spelling on Spelling Frame.• Choose 5 words. Learning Project - to be done throughout the week.

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about food. Learning may focus on where different foods originate from, what makes a healthy meal, opportunities to cook etc.

- Let's Wonder - What is a balanced diet? Find out about the 5 food groups. Make slides or posters about what they find out about.
Where does their food come from? Which foods come from the UK?
What is Fairtrade?
- Let's Create - Make repeated pattern prints for decorative purposes using various natural materials, e.g potato printing or create some still life observational sketches of fruit. Look at the artwork of Giuseppe Arcimboldo. Have a go at recreating some of his paintings with fruit.
- Be Active - Food provides us with energy and we need energy to exercise and this keeps us fit. Why not choose a dance from [Super Movers](#)? Recommendation at least 2 hours of exercise a week.
- Time to Talk - As a family, design a healthy meal plan for the week. Discuss their favourite foods and why they enjoy them. Talk about healthy and unhealthy foods and explain the importance of eating a balanced diet.
- Understanding Others and Appreciating Differences - Lunch around the world. Look at lunch around the world and investigate how differently people eat in other parts of the world.
- Reflect - Make a meal by combining a variety of ingredients using a range of cooking techniques. Measure and weigh ingredients appropriately to prepare and cook a range of savoury dishes.
